1. The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian. by Sherman Alexie Reasons: Drugs/alcohol/smoking.

offensive language, racism, sexually explicit, unsuited to age group

- 2. Persepolis, by Marjane Satrapi Reasons: Gambling, offensive language, political viewpoint. Additional reasons: "politically. racially, and socially offensive," "graphic depictions"
- 3. And Tango Makes Three, by Justin Richardson and Peter Parnell

Reasons: Anti-family, homosexuality, political viewpoint, religious viewpoint, unsuited for age group. Additional reasons: "promotes the homosexual agenda"

4. The Bluest Eye, by Toni Morrison **Reasons:** Offensive language.

sexually explicit, unsuited to age aroup, violence

5. It's Perfectly Normal. by Robie Harris

Reasons: Nudity, sex education, sexually explicit, unsuited to age group. Additional reasons: "alleges it child pornography"

- 9. A Stolen Life. by Jaycee Dugard Reasons: Drugs/alcohol/smoking. offensive language, sexually explicit, and unsuited for age group
- 10. Drama, by Raina Telgemeier Reasons: Sexually explicit

Each year, the American Library Association's Office (ALA) for Intellectual Freedom compiles a list of the top ten most frequently challenged books. A challenge is defined as a formal, written complaint, filed with a library or school requesting that materials be removed because of content or appropriateness. The number of challenges reflects only incidents reported. ALA estimates that for every reported challenge, four or five remain unreported. Therefore, ALA does not claim comprehendsiveness in recording challenges. This list was compiled out of 311 challenges as reported by the Office for Intellectual Freedom during 2014.
